


Henry Bibb, formerly enslaved, wrote in 1850:

"I presume there are no class of people in the United States who so highly appreciate the legality of marriage as those persons who have been held and treated as property."

"The relation that subsisted between us, to which I clung, hoping against hope, for years, after we were tom asunder, not having been sanctioned by any loyal power, [could not] be cancelled by a legal process."

At the intersection of the feminist and anti-slavery movements, a courageous, influential group of men and women challenged governmental control of the institution of marriage that it might be reformed to accommodate the fundamental human rights of both men and women.



# Angelina Grimke and Theodore Weld

It was an orthodox antislavery affair, including an integrated guest list; antislavery luminaries; a wedding cake baked by "a colored baker who used nothing but 'free sugar'"; and prayers offered by black and white clergy.


### Senator Jacob Merritt Howard

Interviewing "Aunt Charlotte" in the 1880s



My old master would make me leave my child before day to go to the canefield; and he would not allow me to come back till ten in the morning to nurse my child. I could hear my poor child crying long before I got to it. Sometimes I would have to walk more than a mile. Sometimes I would overstay my time with my baby; then I would have to run all the way back to the field.

# Aunt Charlotte, what became of your baby? were you blest to raise it?

No; my poor child died when it was two years old. Old master's son was the father of my child.

Did its father help to take care of it? Why, no; he never noticed my child.








# Right of Self-Definition

"I discovered the difference between myself and white children. They began to order me about and were told to do so by my master and mistress. They had learned to read, while I was not permitted to have a book in my hand."






