

The AALS Internet & Computer Law Section is pleased to announce a call for papers for a “New Voices in Internet & Computer Law” program during the 2023 AALS Annual Meeting. We seek unpublished papers and works-in-progress on any aspect of law and technology. Early-stage work is welcome. Up to five presenters will be selected.

Eligibility

Junior scholars at AALS member law schools are eligible and encouraged to submit papers. “Junior scholars” includes untenured faculty who have been teaching full-time at a law school for ten or fewer years. Pursuant to AALS rules, faculty at fee-paid non-member law schools, foreign faculty, adjunct and visiting faculty (without a full-time position at an AALS member law school), graduate students, fellows, and non-law school faculty are not eligible to submit. Please note that all presenters at the program are responsible for paying their own annual meeting registration fees and travel expenses.

Submission procedure

Please submit a 500-word abstract and a draft of 5-10 double-spaced pages that contains a summary of the key ideas from the paper to Hannah Bloch-Wehba (hbw@law.tamu.edu) and Blake Reid (blake.reid@colorado.edu) with “AALS Submission: Internet Law” in the subject line. Submissions must be received by September 16, 2022. We will notify accepted authors by September 23, 2022.
