Session #1: Statutory Interpretation in the Era of High Textualism

The Supreme Court increasingly is committed to textualist methods of interpreting statutes, a trend that is reshaping the interpretation of statutes throughout the judiciary. Increasingly, the Court is elaborating its vision of this interpretive methodology, such as in recent efforts by textualist Justices to define textualism as the search for the "original public meaning" of statutes. For scholars of legislation, this presents a vital moment for critical reflection upon statutory interpretation in America. This session therefore calls upon authors to submit works that critically reflect on these (or other) trends in statutory interpretation, in the effort to foster a dialogue about how statutes are interpreted in this emerging era of "high textualism."

Submissions from scholars across fields and at all levels of seniority are welcome.

Session #2: Emerging Scholars in Legislation & Law of the Political Process

This session looks to highlight and discuss the work of emerging scholars in the fields of legislation and the law of the political process. The session seeks submissions from scholars who have been in academic positions for fewer than six years. Any work that addresses the topics of legislation or the law of the political process is welcome.
