Continued relevance of 504 on campus after the ADA

Guidance from Department of Education about disability issues on campus

OCR investigations – an enforcement mechanism that may have "quietly" made higher education more responsive and proactive ????

504 remedies more expansive than ADA remedies in some situations and procedures broader at least in higher education

- Other COVID related issues is long COVID a disability; what about associational disabilities related to COVID; what about those who are immunocompromised?

Highest priority – mental health -- need for counseling procedures related to behavior and conduct

College students highly stressed

Made worse by pandemic

High need for mental health services on campus

High need for "training" for faculty and staff on front line for referral

Need for appropriate responses to concerning conduct – including self harming

Depressed

Different (sometimes "Disruptive")

Dangerous

Highest priority – mental health – what law schools must, can, should do

Assessment of counseling services and procedures for responding to issues of concern on campus

Provide counseling? Liability for not doing so?

Withdrawing students based on mental health concerns?

Ensuring that decisions are based on behavior and conduct, not status

Bar admissions reporting -- deterrence to counseling

Relevance of 504 and ADA to this issue?

Like the homeless person with mental illness in major cities – and trying to address a complex situation to protect the individual and others in the community
