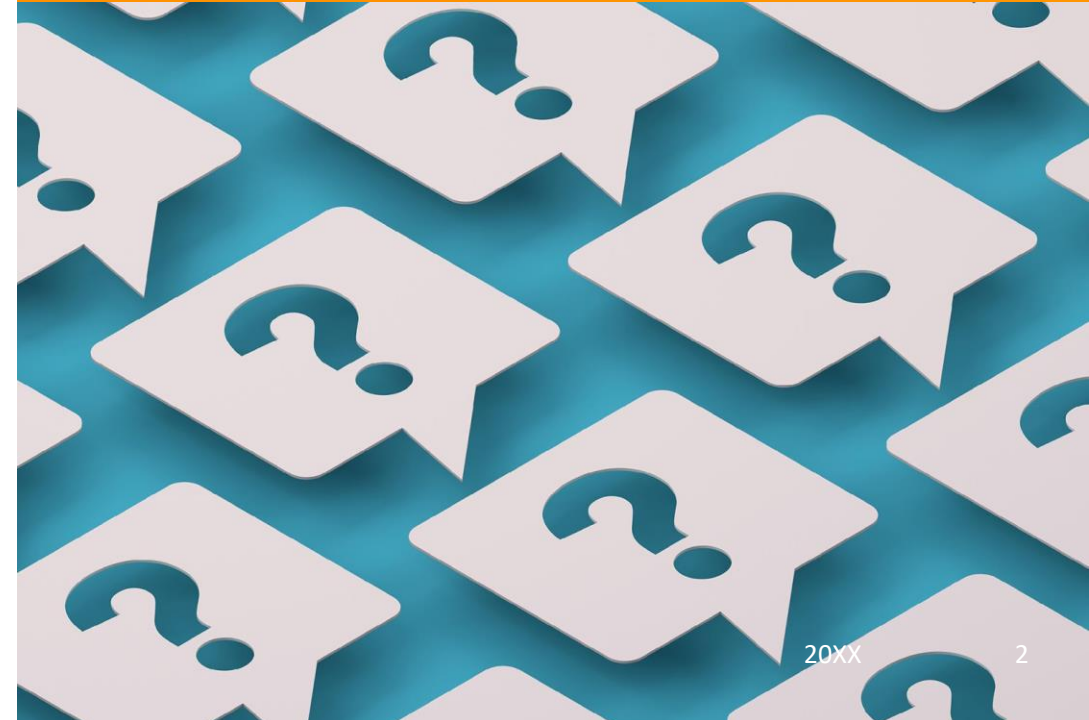

What we know and don't know: item sets

WHAT WE KNOW

NextGen will be an integrated exam that includes item sets.

What doctrine-focused items sets may look like and how they might incorporate different skills.

WHAT WE DON'T KNOW

What research focused item sets may look like.

What writing focused item sets may look like.

Research and Writing Task Lists

Possible Tasks to Test Research Skills

Task 1

Identify an accurate way to frame the research questions that need to be answered.

Task 2

Identify which words or elements in the provided source seem legally significant and/or potentially ambiguous.

Task 3

Identify efficient research strategies (including appropriate search terms) that are likely to uncover other legal sources to assist in this interpretation.

Task 4

Identify the roles and differing characteristics of the sources, including their authoritative weight.

Task 5

Identify the dispositive facts from the opinions, as well as the facts in the client's matter that are analogous to and/or distinct from the dispositive facts in the opinions.

Task 6

Identify other sources, search terms, and/or research strategies that might be used to update sources or find additional sources.

Task 7

Identify which sources are relevant to or dispositive of a legal issue in the matter.

Task 8

Identify whether the sources are sufficient to complete an assigned research or other lawyering task. 20XX

Possible Tasks to Test Writing Skills



Task 1: Draft an email to a client explaining the legal implications of a course of action, updating the client on the status of the client's matter, and/or providing advice on the next steps to be taken in the matter.



Task 2: Draft the specified sections of a complaint or an answer to a complaint.



Task 3: Draft the specified sections of an affidavit.



Task 4: Draft or edit selected specified provisions of a contract.



Task 5: Draft specified section(s) of the document, demonstrating legal analysis in completing lawyering tasks. This task may include: an objective memo; a persuasive brief; or another common document, such as a mediation brief, an opinion letter, or a draft proposal for a contract.

“[T]he majority of stakeholders agree[] that assessing legal writing is something that NCBE does relatively well through the MPT. For this reason, we anticipate having one to two MPT-style extended response drafting items (probably 60 minutes apiece) per exam.”

But Writing is Everywhere on Nextgen: Integrated Assessment

- **Objective:** Demonstrate multiple legal skills in context of a scenario raising one or more substantive or procedural legal issues
- **Layout:** There may be 4-6 questions related to the scenario, some of which will require written responses of varying types and lengths

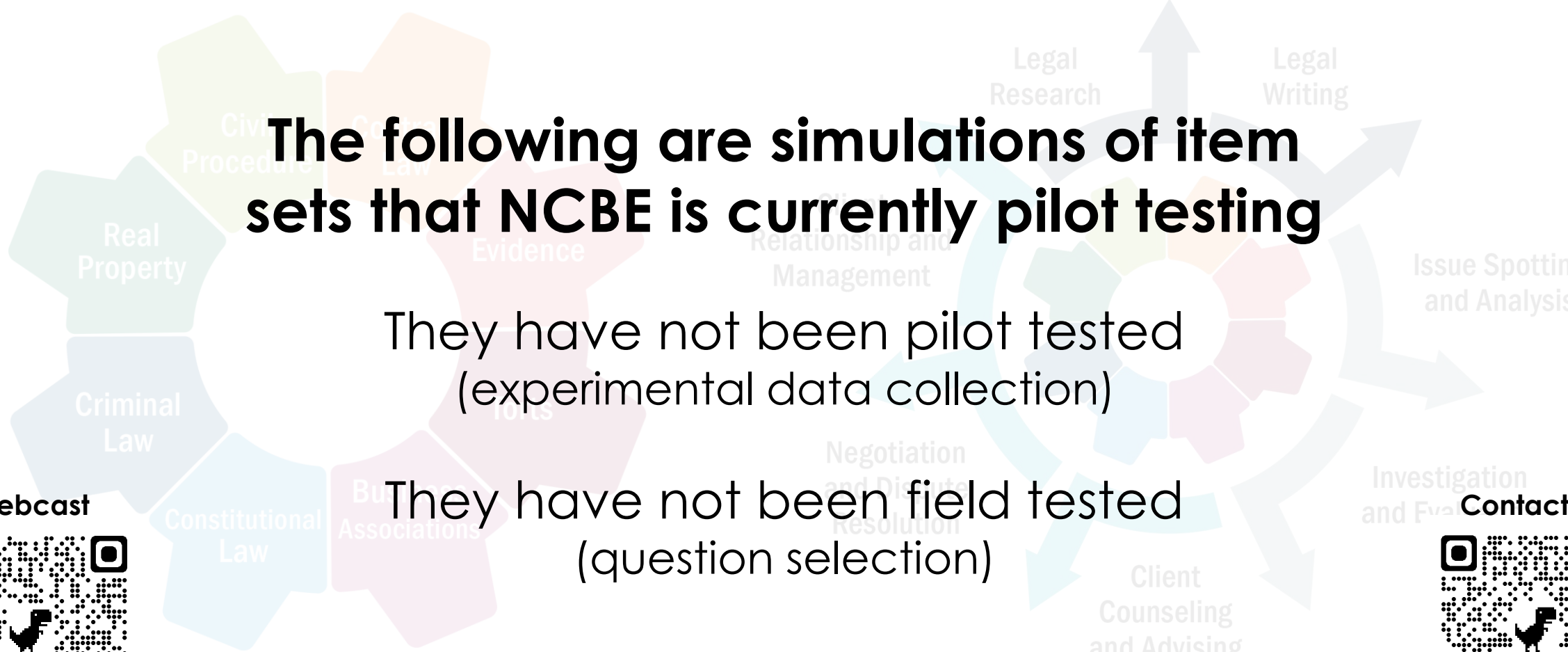

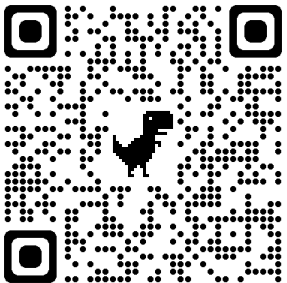

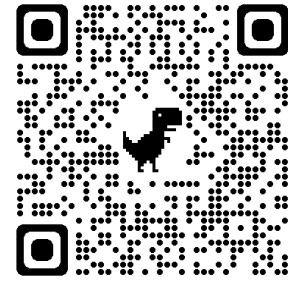

Example Item Set 1: Early Stage of Research



The Facts

Our client, Peterson Engineering Consultants (PEC), seeks our advice regarding issues related to its employees' use of technology. PEC is a privately owned, non-union engineering consulting firm. Most of its employees work outside the office for over half of each workday.

Prompts related to the scenario:

- What **legal issue** will determine whether PEC is potentially liable for the misuse of company-owned technology?
- List **two known facts** that are likely to be legally significant in determining PEC's potential liability for the misuse of company-owned technology.
- List **four steps** that you would take in researching this issue that would help you address the client's concern.
- List **four search terms** that you would use in your research to find relevant legal sources.
