- Learning in law school is an individual process

 - Say hello name and school
 - Shake hands/elbow bump/bow
 - Make eye-contact with all
 - Bonus: smile
- 3 minutes: Think. Share. What makes effective small group discussions?
- Identify 3 or more items as a group
